









# Knitting-Jogless-Stripes

<b>Knit the Main Colour Round:</b>	
	<p>Knit the first round with your main colour, working each stitch in the established pattern or stitch type.</p>
<b>Introducing CC:</b>	
	<p>When you're prepared to introduce the contrast colour (CC), leave a 3-4" tail of the CC yarn.</p>
	<p>Insert the right needle into the first stitch of the round on the left needle. Loop the new yarn (CC) over your right needle and pull up a loop, creating a new stitch. Slide this newly created stitch off the left needle. If you have finished knitting with the MC cut yarn, leaving a 3-4" tail to weave in later. If you will be using the MC within 3-4 rows then you can keep the yarn going.</p>



	<p>Continue to knit the round with the CC.</p>
	<p>Insert the right needle into the stitch below the first stitch of the round (from the previous row) from front to back.</p>
	<p>Slip this stitch onto the left needle.</p>
	<p>Knit this stitch together with the CC stitch. This creates a smooth transition and helps reduce the jog.</p>
<p><b>Continue Knitting:</b></p>	
	<p>Complete the rest of the stitches in the round as usual, knitting with the contrast colour (CC). Knit the rest of the rows as usual.</p>



<b>New Stripes:</b>	If introducing a new colour repeat the steps above for each colour.
<b>Carry Yarn Up:</b>	As you continue knitting, remember to carry the unused colour up the inside of the work, wrapping it around the working yarn at the beginning of each round.
<b>Weave in Ends:</b>	Once you've completed the project, weave in the ends.
<b>Admire Your Creation:</b>	Take a moment to appreciate your work, knowing that you've created a beautiful piece of dog wear with a seamless color transition.
